Swansea International

13 Veterans AC members took part in the big Vets cross-country event of the winter at Swansea and all of them won team medals of some colour. England dominated the five-nation

contest, winning 13 of 15 events. Pam Jones was the sole gold

medallist. At 72, she became the oldest ever women's champion, winning the W65 event by a remarkable 44 seconds from her team mate Christine Lee. Pam had won the W50 gold, 19 years earlier, and this was her fourth individual title. Pam led the England team to an easy team gold and was delighted with her success.

Taking an individual silver was Jane Davies, who was new to the W60 age group. She finished a minute down on runaway age group winner Angela Copson, as England scored a 1-2-3.

Another to take silver was five times champion Nigel Gates, who closed to within 7 seconds of his illustrious team mate Mike Hager, as England again dominated. The Brighton athlete finished fourth in the combined M50-M60 race. "Although it was my lowest position



in this race, that was then and this is now. I have missed a lot of training and races this year and so I was really pleased with my performance and thoroughly enjoved the

Keith Newton of Herne Hill Harriers took silver in the M45 age group, with another strong, consistent run. He finished 22

seconds behind team-mate Daniel Moore, as England went 1-2-3-4.

England weren't as dominant in M40 but last year's runner up lain

Lockett, not in his 2007 form, made the top six to ensure England won. Ben Reynolds, a late addition to the England team, didn't make the scorers, but as all the team, gain a medal, whether they score or not, didn't go home empty handed.

Liam O'Hare, who resides in Spain and is a member of an English vets club, this one, won team gold for Ireland! Liam was 7th M60 as Ireland inflicted two defeats on the England teams, including M35.

Mike Mann, making his England debut, wasn't on his best crosscountry form but was third scorer in the team that came second.

Clare Elms, Mann's Dulwich Runners club-mate fared better in the W40 race, taking individual bronze and being part of an English clean sweep. Elms had injury problems leading up to the race, and was pleased with what she thought was her best crosscountry run to date.

Another Dulwich, Andrea Pickup, who lives in the same road as Clare, took a W35 team gold, just; it depended on Andrea beating Ireland's 4th scorer, which she did.

In the same race John Batchelor was fourth in the English M65 team which made a clean sweep. M70 Ed Simpson had a team gold.

Ann Bath competed for Scotland and took a team silver in the W55.

Other VACs won spots as reserves including W55s Jane Georghiou, Ros Tabor and Margaret Moody, M45s Mike Boyle, Julian Critchlow and Stuart McLay, M50 Steve Smythe, M70 Keith Spacie and W60 Pauline Rich. *Results are on page 11.*

My athletic shortcomings were rumbled by the national coach, John Le Mesurier, when I was 12. My mother, a councillor on the old LCC. had buttonholed him at some official function and convinced him he needed to check out a future world-beater. Down at Wimbledon Park track, I could tell Le Mesurier was unimpressed as I longjumped 4 feet, could barely reach my knees in a toetouching exercise, and took for ever to run a lap.

My athletic career was further blighted by my mother when in a moment of playful daftness she challenged me to lift her off the ground – which I did, only to lose my footing and land painfully on my right hip with her on top. The damage was not immediately apparent, but became so a while later as I hurtled round the track in a school relay and my right hip came hurtling out of its socket. I recovered, but it would haunt

me later.

My first cross-country was the Wandsworth district scouts annual event. I was a distant second, and the future international John Bicourt a distant third. Bicourt joined Belgrave and went on to have a distinguished running career. I eventually joined the now defunct

Surrey AC and didn't. I'd gone in the hope of finding some training guidance. It seemed to consist mainly of circuit training, which is possibly why I didn't make much impact (65th in the southern youths, 171st in the national) and perhaps why the club fizzled – although it had some good runners at the time like the miler John Snowden and the southern junior champion Dave Gibson.

I drifted away from athletics for a while as other interests intervened. Of the more athletic ones, a couple of years of karate were ended by a few mawashi-geris too many and a recurrence of the hip problem, with a physio predicting a hip replacement by fifty. The hankering remained, though, and I decided my life would not be complete without a marathon under my belt. This was a little before the invention of the London Marathon when the distance was still widely thought to be

intrinsically risky, a notion nurtured by near-death images of Jim Peters. I felt otherwise, and did the Masters and Maidens.

It was about this time that Bob Belmore, who lived up the road in Chiddinafold. founded Waverley Harriers, and my eldest daughter Lucy was showing distance running potential. We both signed up and found ourselves in a thriving group driven by the indefatigable Bob. Lucy reached top 10 placings in national events and a number 2 ranking in the girls 1500 metres. Eventually injury took over and she joined the far too long list of promising youngsters who fell away from the sport. After the Athens Olympics, we read a Mail feature on two girls who used to beat Kelly Holmes: it amused us as Lucy had beaten all three.

Shift work at the BBC as a World Service news editor allowed a fair bit of time for training, although the run of four nights that came around every three weeks wasn't ideal. In 1982 Mick Woods devised a fearsome course for the first Farnham Marathon with a diabolical hill right at the end. It was run in a howling gale. Mick won in 2:35 followed by me about two-n-a-half minutes later. >p13

Paddy Clark continued

The miles piled up and the times came down, with a 2:27 in the London Marathon in 1984. I felt I could go guicker. and after a long injury lay-off racked up the mileage and the intervals again as a new vet in 1985. Things seemed to be coming together in the Hog's Back, where I was running a few seconds behind three leading vets of the day - Ogden, Dow and Johnston - when my right hamstring went at the top of the climb at that unless I went down a 8 miles.

Flummoxed, I stood there while about ten blokes went past, but with the traffic bearing down (the last 3 miles were along the dual carriageway those days) I could only see one way back, so started up again, passed ten in 52something and managed to hold 4th in the vets. The right leq was never quite the same again, although with the help of the left it managed a 2:29 for London in 1987.

1995 saw me drawing on my north-of-the-border ancestry for a berth in the Scottish M50 team for the international at Malahide near Dublin. True to form, the right lea started playing up and hampering training, but it held up

enough for me to come in as 4th Scot and help the team to a bronze.

Two years later, the World Service commissioned me to do a 15-minute programme on running the Everest Marathon, Athletic disaster was waiting to ambush me not in the guise of injury this time, but altitude sickness. Up near base camp the day before the event, the medical team concluded I had pulmonary oedema and warned couple of thousand feet I might die. It was seven miles down the course, and left me wondering what I was going to tell the listeners.

I was surprised to find the contestants who suffered a similar fate included several Gurkhas, who I thought thrived on thin air. They let us ioin in after the first ten runners had gone through, and I finished by catching all but the first three, who were all Nepalese, Frustratingly, I think I'd have finished first European even if I'd done the whole 26, as the next guy in didn't show for another 20 mins.

Well, it was downhill then. and it's been pretty well downhill ever since, with the constant struggle against the



ravages of time. Sticking to cross-country training (there's a big selection out my way in the Surrey/Sussex borders) and racing - Surrey League, Hampshire League with Winchester for a while, and the good old VAC races has kept down the impact both of running and of slowing times.

No more road race PWs if I can help it. Many years ago I used to think I'd have long since given up, but not any more. There's something about the camaraderie of those Saturday afternoon races - and a bit of the old competitive buzz. And if the legs really refuse to go, there's always the marshalling ...

So why is it that veterans indoor events are not as well supported as they should be? I am talking from a middle distance stance. Like all track running there you are in a very exposed and measured environment, with spectators able to chart your every step. the ignominy of being lapped. Last winter I achieved the first of being lapped in a 1500m race where M35 upwards competed in one event.

Do athletes think that there is a risk of injury on a tighter track, or any track? Certainly at around 80 second speed and above I do not think this is a consideration; I did once fall off a bend many years ago trying to do a 28 second 200!

There is really no reason why even those who consider themselves mainstream cross country runners should not try the indoor circuit, even as a means to an end, say mid winter speed work. One of the features I like most is in mid February the feeling of run-
